Car Buff Heaven: Cite de L'Automobile

n 2017 my wife and I decided to take a tour of France. The tour, Holy sites and Cathedrals of France, crisscrossed France for 17 days taking in the history and the treasures of art and buildings created by man more than a thousand years ago - all achieved without electricity, computers or power tools. This is a magnificent display of human faith, creativity and ingenuity that will inspire us for eternity. On the last weekend of our vacation I broke loose from the tour in Lyon and headed by train to the city of Mulhouse on the German and Swiss border. My destination? Another masterpiece, but for the car buff this time: CITE DE L'AUTOMOBILE (City of the

Automobile), considered by many to be one the world's premiere museums of automobiles, memorabilia and radiator mascots.


The collection holds 560 vehicles and represents 97 different makes from 1887 to 1970. The museum was the passion of the Schlumpf brothers, who began

collecting the world's most beautiful and fastest vehicles in the 1940's. The brothers were businessmen and owned wool and textile mills and became very successful during the first part of the 20th century. They had the funds and vision to buy the world's rarest automobiles during the 50's and 60's when they were still reasonably priced.

Wow, and what amazing cars do they have! Their collection boasts 130 classic Bugattis from the 20's and 30's. Perhaps the world's greatest automotive genius of this era, Etore Bugatti, built the fastest, most luxurious and technologically advanced cars of their day. In the 1920's he won over 1000 races with what at the time was the world's fastest cars. His reputation was legendary. He built beautiful works of art that were crafted with streamlined bodies, the best materials and race-proven engines. His crown jewel



was the Bugatti Royale. In 1930 during the depression, they cost \$30,000 to \$40,000 each at a time when a Duesenberg cost \$17,000! Only six of these were built for Royalty and no less than four of these behemoths reside at this museum. At a time when a basic classic Bugatti commands \$2 million dollars and a Royale is valued at \$50 million you can appreciate the rarity and significance of the cars in this museum (they have 130 of them!) Today it is considered a French National Treasure.

You will not find American cars in this collection. The best European collections of Mercedes Benz, Rolls Royce, Alfa Romeos, Hispano Suizas, Delahayes and Ferraris

among many other makes are represented. There are endless rows of vehicles displayed from the 1880s and on as you walk along the streets, filled with period memorabilia and with many video displays of each makes significance. All are housed inside a huge 100 year old Woolen Mill building with period lighting.

After 3 and a half hours and countless miles walked I was overwhelmed, so I went to the cafeteria and met four chaps from England and we talked all about British cars. As we talked and ate from the second floor, we observed the racetrack down below with classic cars making the circuit. For just \$50 you can personally drive your choice of 5 classic cars around the circuit for 6 laps. No hot-rodding though — maximum speed allowed is 40 mph! We had a lengthy discussion on which classic we would pick. Our choices were a 50s era Jaguar XK, Corvette, MG, Maserati and Jaguar XKE.

Back to The Schlumpf brothers. In the 1970s the worlds textile industry got destroyed by Asian competition and the brothers ran into hard times. There was not enough money to pay the Mills employees and the French government began investigating. The brothers fled to the Swiss Border to avoid jail time.



French officials examining the property were shocked to find huge boarded-up buildings filled to the brim with these classic treasures. The brothers had no children, were very secretive with their collection and only a few trusty mechanics knew it existed.

Fortunately for us, it has a better ending than Bill Harrah's collection that was sold off to pay inheritance taxes. Here the French had vision! After years of debate on whether to auction the collection off to pay the mill's debts, French politicians decided to pay them off by tapping into the French Treasury. This, along with the millions it cost to update the historic Mill building and make it a first-class museum attraction for Europe, was covered by the French people and various government agencies.

Today 36 years later it has surely proven to be a wise decision. This amazing collection, which would be impossible to duplicate in any form or fashion in today's world, is a source of much pride for the French people and brings thousands of tourists to the city of Mulhouse and the Alsace region. It is certainly a masterpiece for us to savor and enjoy. Make sure you add it to your Bucket List!,
