1910 REO (with a Great Story) Joins Summer Display

Gary Hodges' 1910 Reo has been in his family for 102 years!

useum member Gary Hodges' original unrestored REO will be on display at the museum this summer. It has been in Gary's family since it was purchased in 1909 by his great grandfather, on his mother's side. It was purchased in Sacramento, California and driven to Paisley, Oregon and the family ranch. His great grandfather passed on in 1914 and the REO went to Gary's grandfather who gave it to Gary in the 1950s, when it then came to Salem. Therefore, it has spent its entire existence in one family in Oregon.

At one time in the 1960's, there were quite a few early REOs in the Salem area owned by different collectors. Most have gone to other owners or have moved out of the area, but the Hodges' REO remains in Salem and in the same family. Gary has no plans to restore his REO because, as the saying goes, "it's only original once." Gary is looking for a top and windshield, so any help would be appreciated. It is very special to be in the same family for 102 years...especially for a car!





hile glancing through James
Colwills' most splendid book The
Automotive Mascot: A Design in
Motion for this quarter's newsletter entry,
this particular mascot jumped out and
caught my eye.

Designed in 1931 by William B. Vanderift and Sigfred O. Bystrom, it is called the "Action Twins."

These twins obviously hand-cranked a propeller that gave forward motion to your vehicle. A most impressive mascot standing still and said to be "magical" when in full operation.

The Toy Box: MG TD Roadster

ere we have a large, nicely detailed model of the MG TD roadster. This all metal scale toy sports a die-cast metal body, steel chassis frame with hollow rubber tires. It's very heavy and is over 15 inches long. Front wheels turn via the steering wheel and rear end attaches with leaf springs. Very highly detailed for it's era and all metal except for the seats and headlight lenses.

Made by Doepke in Rossmoyne, Ohio in 1953. It was one their "Model Toys" line. They also made a version of the Jaguar XK120 with the same nice detailing.

They were sold as a kit and required assembly. Parts are screwed together no glue required. This particular MG was painted MG Ivory with Apple green interior. A factory offered MG color combination.

Values today \$300-500 depending on condition. As in real life, the Jaguar version brings much more.
