HIGHLIGHTS of the 2022 summer display

1936 Cord 810 Phaeton "Coffin Nose"

(second from front) was America's fastest production car in the 1930s capable of 107 mph. The car was so far ahead of its time in its radical styling and its stance being much lower than contemporary automobiles. It had a long list of automotive firsts like front wheel drive, semi-automatic 4 speed transmission, concealed headlamps, no running boards, full gauge dashboard, electric intermittent wipers, tachometer, the first gas cap, flush mounted tail lamps and radios as standard equipment. Many celebrities like Clark Gable, Gary Cooper and Amelia Earhart drove them.



The oldest unrestored school bus in the nation is our **1919 Ford Model TT School Bus** (not pictured). It served the small rural town of Hammonton, New Jersey. Imagine over 100 years ago, for the children this would have been their first ride in an automobile. There is a dunce seat next to the driver for troublemakers. It had to be cranked to start in freezing weather, had no heater, no emergency exits, no safety glass and a 15-gallon gas tank bomb inside the bus. The engine, wooden body, interior and graphics are all original and unrestored. It is priceless and one of a kind.



Famous in the Pacific Northwest, "Jeannie" (left) is a crowd favorite. She is a 1909 Cadillac Model 30 Touring Demi-Tonneau. She is one of the first cars in central Oregon being owned by a rancher from Prineville. Later in the late 30s and 40s she was on display at the Buick dealership in Eugene, Oregon. She was restored in the early 50s and participated in many of the early Horseless Carriage events. She was a beloved fixture of the Portland Rose Parade for decades. Famous dignitaries and Rose Festival Queens were her passengers. Now she resides in our museum for all to enjoy.



The 1917 Stutz Bearcat (left) is credited with being America's first true sports car. A race car for street use. Each car was personally tested at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway when completed and they went on to win 25 of 30 races entered in 1915. The big four-cylinder engine of nearly 400 cubic inches featured four valves and two spark plugs per cylinder producing 80 horsepower. It is capable of a top speed of 80 miles per hour at a time when almost all our roads where dirt or gravel. Oh and by the way, there are no brakes on the front wheels only on the rear!

When the **1964 Jaguar XKE** (not pictured) was introduced 60 years ago, it caused a sensation all over the world with its looks, handling, and speed. Many called it the most beautiful car ever made. Technologically it was way advanced with 4-wheel power disk brakes, rack and pinion steering, 4-wheel independent suspension and a dual overhead cam motor with 265 hp in a 2600 lb. car. Many of these features are standard in today's cars. With a top speed of 150 mph, it was the fastest production car at the beginning of the 1960s and a bargain at a price of \$6000.

In 1909 a Maxwell like our 1910 Maxwell Model Q (right, foreground) was driven from New York to San Francisco by Alice Huyler Ramsey, the first woman to drive coast to coast - an amazina feat at the time. Maxwell cars were built from 1904 to 1925 and known for their power and reliability. Maxwells were popular with women and in the early teens were the third most popular manufacturer after Ford and Buick. They were taken over by Chrysler in 1925. The engine is 4-cylinder, 22hp, with a top speed of 53 mph.



1926 Ford Model T Speedster #1 (above, second car from front). Henry Ford built 15 million Tin Lizzies. They were affordable, simple and durable and a great platform for our students to learn the basics of auto mechanics with used and new parts being readily available. The Speedster model was built lighter without fenders and lighter bodies as the hot rods of their day. Our Speedster is the first one built by our students and sports a sharp all-wooden body. We are very proud of our high school speedster students who worked on this car, and the many others that have followed since 2008.

This 1908 REO Gentlemen's Roadster (pictured here) was a fast and powerful ride at the beginning of the century. The brainchild of Ransom E. Olds automotive pioneer who is credited with Oldsmobile, the assembly line and the first mass produced automobile (1901 curved dash Olds). The car had a 2-cylinder 20hp motor with 2-speed transmission and chain drive. REO cars were produced from 1904 to 1936 and trucks until 1975. Our 1930 Fire Truck (not pictured) is also a REO.

The 1933 Alfa Romeo 8C 2300 Monza (not pictured) is a racing legend. In the 1930s it dethroned Bugatti as the most successful racer in Europe's major races like the Grand Prix, Le Mans and Targa Florio. The Supercharged straight 8 motor with twin overhead cams is a work of art. It produced 175 horsepower and propelled this car to 120 miles per hour. By far the fastest production car in the world. This is a very rare automobile with only 4 or 5 remaining in the world.



The early Honda collection (in windows, below) includes a **1963 Honda Trail 55**, **1964 Trail 90**, **1967 305 Super Hawk**, **1972 Trail 90 & 1974 X75**. Honda coined the phrase "You meet the nicest people on a Honda" in the 1960's. Most motorcycle riders started off learning to ride a smaller motorcycle. This collection of Hondas brings back fond memories of their youth for many of these riders. You hear the phrase a lot: "Hey I had one of those when I was a kid!"



Our 1915 & 1919 Harley Davidsons (not pictured) are both early examples of Harley V-twins that later led to the well-known "knucklehead" and "panhead" models. These show the early innovative designs that brought Harley to lead the market with a 3-speed transmission, kick starter and automatic oil pump. Before that time most American motorcycles just had a 2-speed primitive transmission, pedal start (as in pedaling a bicycle) and a hand oil pump that required the rider to pump oil into the engine when they "thought" it needed it.



A trio of Triumphs! Come see our **1953 Triumph T100C** (foreground) and **1949 Triumph Grand Prix** (#43). The Grand Prix was a factory race bike that was produced for only two years (1949 &50) and only 151 were made. This was the start of the post WW2 Triumph race bikes that came to dominate world and USA racing into the 1970's. After the Grand Prix production was stopped there was still a high demand for Triumph race bikes so in 1953 Triumph put all the race equipment on a street legal motorcycle to meet this demand. It was made for one year only. The 350cc Triumph twin (background) – a **1950 Triumph 3T** – is in completely original condition and therefore is very rare and a time capsule of machines from that period.

- Education is our purpose. We strive to educate the general public about the heritage, history, and evolution of the automobile and motorcycles.
- Twenty-seven vintage cars and 22 motorcycles are currently on display.
- We are very proud of our Speedster program. In the last 14 years, more than 60 at-risk high school students have learned character, teamwork, and automotive skills.
- We are member-owned, 100% volunteer run, and have no paid employees.

- We are a 501(c)(3) non profit. Your donations are tax-deductible and sincerely appreciated. You are giving to a good cause that educates the public and the next generations.
- Our museum encompasses a 2-acre site with a one-acre show field that was named Chandler Field, after early Museum member John Chandler, and has a 125-car capacity.
- ♣ Facilities include 1930s gas station, restoration shop and a 22,000 square foot display building.
- Our facilities are available for rent, including winter vehicle storage, family reunions, club shows, and more!
- Our final phase build-out is 6,000 sf to include conference room, library, elevator and toilets.
