hanks to all who contributed to our long-term vision of developing an unused portion of the Museum upstairs into a 6,000 square foot Learning Center and multi-use facility. We have been moving forward with the first phase of construction with funding the installation of an elevator, planned from the beginning.

A special thanks to members Jerry and Andy Van Zant of Van Zant Construction for donating their time and efforts to coordinate work and act as liaison with subcontractors to build the elevator support structure and surrounding walls.

This facility will include extra bathrooms, a warming kitchen, theater, meeting room for club activities, a library, and computers for our students. The educational opportunities are endless as well as hosting events such as weddings, memorial services, birthdays, reunions, movies...the list goes on!

We will soon move on to the next phase of finishing the walls, flooring, and utilities, and will need to continue fundraising efforts until finished. When done, we should be able to be self-supporting through rental fees and club dues. Completion of phase one should be done this summer with ongoing work during closed days. Thanks again to all the dedicated volunteers helping on this project.

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Featured Book from the Ferne Hellie Library: The Auto Math Handbook byJohn Lawlor

his book can best be described as a collection of the most basic calculations, formulas and equations required for engine and car building for the layperson.

Some of the chapter topics are compression ratios, piston speed, g-force and weight transfer, and tire sizes and their effects. Each of the seventeen chapters concludes with a table summarizing the formulas it has covered.


Most of the formulas are written in plain English or easily recognized abbreviations such as rpm and mph.

A chapter is even included on how to figure blood alcohol concentration in a driver!

Appendix A is a list of conversion factors for United States and metric units of measure that could be of use to the automobile aficionados.

Math no longer has to be a necessary evil. With the *Auto Math Handbook*, you'll be able to make simple, accurate calculations to achieve the utmost performance from your car!

I am highlighting this book because I found the topic very interesting, especially since math is not my strong subject! The author breaks down formulas so they are VERY easy to understand. It goes into the reasoning behind the formulas and gives lots of good examples. The Auto Math Handbook could be useful to the mentors of the Speedster Program to help explain formulas to a student. Take a look at it on the book stand in the Ferne Hellie Library.

Since Don is taking a few (well earned) weeks off, Jack and crew will complete the engine installation. A new mentor will step up soon to start the metal work on the Model A coupe. We are looking forward to the mating of the two assemblies to create a complete Model A.

Our most recent acquisition is an automated parts washer. I call it a dishwasher because it

works like one. It currently sits next to the heater. Last week the machine shop crew prepared the machine and cleaned one of our donated MGB blocks. From the pictures you can see how clean the engine is inside and out. This was accomplished in 12 minutes! That saved the students from hours of work at a solvent bench, and they still wouldn't have gotten it as clean as the dishwasher did! It was a big purchase but it will more than earn its keep. Additionally, it will include what to do when you come on duty and what to do at the end of your shift. Information about making sales at the gift shop is also on the agenda, as well as details about the displays. There will be handouts and opportunities to ask questions as well.

Porby was conducted annually from 1908 to 1917. Famed driver Barney Oldfield came from behind to win the 1914 Cactus Derby earning him the title "Master Driver of the World." In its day, Stutz Bearcats were the fastest sports cars. We have a 1917 Stutz Bearcat in the Museum that looks similar to this car. Back then you could watch these races in the streets of your own town. Racing through towns was an exciting novelty during the infancy of the automobile. This painting from that era was actually found in a museum in Tubac, Arizona.

YOU Can Help MUSEUMS

crtunately, the largest old car and truck hobby museums are here to stay, thanks to years of effort by many enthusiasts who donated their time and money toward establishing those museums, and who continue to do so in order to keep them operating. However, many midsize and small museums are not in the same position and seem to come and ao. It's an unfortunate fact in every hobby, not just old car and truckrelated museums. It takes a lot of organization and people to keep any museum flourishing — curators to keep displays interesting and people returning, fundraising staff to bring in additional money, marketing personnel to introduce the museum to the public, and that's just for starters. Add in the mechanics and detailers required for a car or truck museum and the necessary museum staff grows. Without a trust in place, small and midsize museums that are funded by private individuals are likely to eventually disappear when the founder dies. And even with a trust, some midsize and smaller museums still fade away when the succeeding operators throw in the towel due to lack of interest or funding to get visitors in the door with their admission bucks. But fear not, there are steps all of us can take to help make our hobby museums thrive.

Host an event at a nearby museum or collection. If you're part of a car club or group that holds regular cruise-ins, meet at a museum or car collection instead of a mall or fast-food restaurant. You can even work with the museum or collection to host a car show and/ or swap meet in its parking lot. Anything that will draw people to a museum's parking lot will also help usher people through its doors. People sometimes need an excuse to stop at any kind of establishment, even if they've been considering doing so for a long time. Walking through an unfamiliar building's doors is also intimidating to some people, so if you can get people in the parking lot, you're more likely to get them inside where they may return again and again. If a museum's parking lot won't work for a car show you're organizing, consider including it as a stop during a cruise.


Volunteer your time. Museums certainly need docents and people with dusting skills, but they also need many other types of help. If you have computer, marketing, mechanical, photography, video, writing or fundraising skills, your local museum could probably use your services. If your skills aren't on this list, still inquire. There are many other skills needed to operate a museum, some of which may not have even occurred to you.

If you have a collection of vehicle-related items you'd like to sell, or if you manufacture an item relevant to the museum, offer it to the museum's gift shop where it can earn a profit on each item sold. A self-published book or coloring book, a model, a poster and more are just what museums

are looking to sell in their gift shops.

Many people allow their cars to be shown in museum displays, and that's surely a help. If you're considering selling that car, inquire whether the car can be advertised for sale while in the museum in a consignment-type arrangement where the museum can earn money from its sale.

Spread the word about museums. If you're handing out a car show flyer at another event, offer to hand out flyers for a local museum at the same time. If you have taken additional steps to support a museum, drop me a note and we'll share them in "Sound Your Horn" to help keep our hobby museums' doors open and introducing new people to the old cars and trucks we love.
